

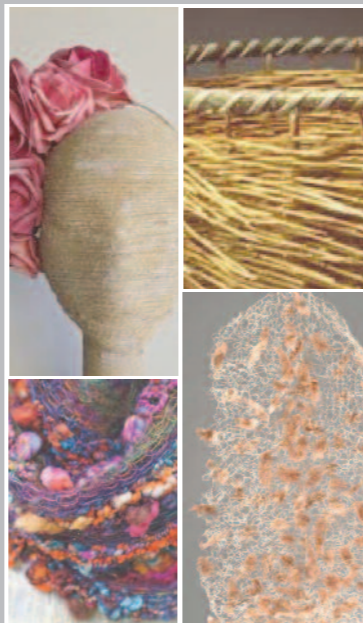

Protecting Roadside Reserves

COUNCIL has adopted a new policy and associated procedures to better protect important areas of roadside vegetation.

Council's Town Planner Claire Golder said, "Council is responsible for approximately 3,900 hectares of road reserve.

Due to Temora Shire's high agricultural value, roadside reserves are often all that remain of the native

vegetation that previously extended right across inland NSW. It is therefore important that Council manages these reserves for their biodiversity worth, as well as the aesthetic and amenity values.

Councils must also balance these values with the need to provide safe roads for motorists.

The new policy, supported by a range of works

procedures, will assist Council officers in assessing the potential environmental impacts of roadside works, and managing these impacts during construction."

This project has been assisted by grant funding from the New South Wales Government through its Environmental Trust and supported by Local Government NSW.

INLAND RAIL ON TRACK

Community drop-in session at Temora on 1 August

ARTC Inland Rail will be holding a number of community drop-in sessions throughout the region in early August.

The sessions – including one in Temora on 1 August – will give interested locals a chance to hear

the latest updates on the 37km Illabo to Stockinbingal (I2S) section of the Inland Rail route.

Members of the I2S team will share information about the 250m-wide Focus Area of Investigation (FAI) and discuss elements of

the project's 70% Feasibility Design. Community members are warmly invited to attend the Temora drop-in session to ask questions, have their say on the FAI and 70% design, and meet members of the Inland Rail team.

Illegal Dumping

COUNCIL have an "open-door" policy to encourage residents to report illegal dumping of waste in the Temora Shire.

Residents are urged to report any illegal dumping anonymously by contacting Council directly. Alternatively, you can report illegal dumping via the RIDonline website.

RIDonline is a database used by councils and government agencies across NSW to record and manage illegal dumping incidents.

When you report via RIDonline, you will be asked

- to:
- Upload a picture of the dumped waste
- Provide the address of the incident using the GPS on your device or select a location on the provided map
- Describe the type of dumped waste
- Council will receive an email alert about the incident and respond with the appropriate measure.
- When you report illegal dumping, you help the EPA and local council to:
- Protect human health and the environment

- Detect and penalise dumpers
- Find and clean up dumped waste
- Identify dumping hot spots
- If the dumped waste causes an emergency (e.g. containing toxic fumes or a large chemical spill) call 000 and report it immediately.
- If the dumped waste is an immediate threat to human health or the environment (e.g. asbestos or toxic chemical) call the EPA Environment Line on 131 555.

Be Smart When Burning



AS the days and nights turn colder residents are urged to be cautious when using fires both inside and out.

The Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) have an extensive set of laws to ensure pollution is kept to a minimum and that safety is the first priority when burning fires around the home.

Smoke from wood burning fires can have

harmful effects if the appropriate precautions are not taken.

The EPA suggests the following steps as best practice for using a wood fire in the home:

- Clean your chimney every year
- Use only dry, aged and untreated wood
- Use small logs instead of large ones
- Don't let your fire smoulder overnight

The frail, elderly and the very young are most at risk from harmful wood smoke pollutants.

Residents considering backyard incinerator burning for clearing waste are reminded that NSW legislation states that all burning (other than burning of vegetation) is prohibited except with approval or in relation to certain domestic waste.

Farmer Education Funding

THE Farm Business Skills Professional Development Program is an initiative of the NSW Government's Drought Strategy and was developed to support farmers by providing access to vocational and skills training. Three professional development priority areas have been identified:

- Risk management
- Financial and business management
- Farm business planning / drought preparedness

What can you claim?

Approved participants can claim a 50% subsidy of up to \$5000 for the first individual. There is an additional \$1000 available per person for a maximum of four people for a total maximum of \$9000 per farm business. This subsidy may be used to cover course costs including course fees, travel costs, child/respite

care costs and/or software specifically relating to a course.

Courses for farmers

Pre-approved courses - Over 95 pre-approved courses are available ranging from farm business planning to leadership and people management. Once you have completed one of these courses, you can submit a claim for a 50% subsidy of course costs.

Other professional development activities - Farmers can alternatively attend other types of training to suit their farm business needs. This training may take the form of group training or one-on-one sessions with your financial advisor, accountant or lawyer. You will need to apply for pre-approval of this training to ensure you can successfully claim the 50% subsidy.

ORGANISER SOUGHT FOR RV MUSTER

THE Temora RV Muster has become a popular event on the calendar of many caravanning fanatics. The first event, held in 2017, was such a success that the second event, held in April this year, was sold out quickly with RV enthusiasts taking part in a number of local experiences.

The 2019 Muster contributed over \$60,000 to our local economy and the two Musters generated over \$10,000 in donations to youth related initiatives within the Temora Shire.

"The event is a not-for-profit meaning that all funds raised can be donated to a selected community group or charity,

putting it straight back into our economy," said retiring organiser, Elaine Costello.

"This year the Temora Youth Teams were the chosen community group and they contributed to the Muster by providing catering and entertainment to our guests," she said.

Temora Shire Council is now seeking a new organiser for the event. The successful candidate will ideally be a caravanning enthusiast with connections in the caravanning world as well as a network of helpers in the Temora Shire. The new organiser will be supported by Council and past organiser, Mrs Elaine Costello.

"We are looking for a highly organised person who has a passion for caravanning and camping and is committed to contributing to the wider Temora Shire community," said Council's Economic Development Manager, Craig Sinclair.

"The event is held every two years in April and runs for a week. Visitors are given a variety of itinerary options that show off the very best aspects of our shire. The new organiser will have the advantage of Mrs Costello's excellent organisation of the past events as a foundation for building future musters," he concluded.

Amendments for Rehoming Pets



FROM July 1st, 2019, anyone who advertises dogs or cats for sale, including those for free, will be required to include an identifying number in the advertisement.

This requirement applies to all advertisements including those in newspapers, local posters, community noticeboards and all forms of online advertising including public advertisements on websites and social media.

The identifying number can be either each animal's microchip number, a Breeder Identification Number or a Rehoming Organisation Number.

If a person fails to use one of these numbers or uses a number that the person knows to be false, a

fine of \$300 may apply if a penalty notice is issued.

The maximum court ordered penalty for failing to comply will be \$5,500.

This change aims to improve the identification of companion animals to support better traceability of cats and dogs and promote responsible pet ownership, and gives effect to the Government's response to the NSW Parliament Joint Select Committee Enquiry on Companion Animal Breeding Practices.

Councils will be required, like all other people and organisations, to comply with the new advertising requirement which will be enforced by animal welfare enforcement agencies and not by councils.

A Dividing Issue



THERE are legal processes regarding the position and construction of boundary fences. The Dividing Fences Act 1991 and local planning laws cover all aspects of fencing and boundaries.

Before constructing a fence it is best to arm yourself with the correct information to avoid problems. Always begin with a conversation with your neighbour to see if you can reach an agreement about the proposed fencing work.

NEVER go ahead and build or replace a boundary fence without having a signed agreement with the owner of the adjoining property. Failing to have a signed agreement may make it difficult to

enforce your neighbour to contribute to the cost, furthermore your neighbour may obtain permission to have the structure removed and replaced at your expense.

In NSW, disputes over fences are dealt with firstly via mediation. Should mediation fails you can contact the court or the Consumer and Commercial Division of the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal and start the process of obtaining an Order to Fence.

What to include in a written agreement:

- Fence location, for example the common boundary line, the same line as the old fence or

some other location

- Fence height, length and building material, including colour and style
- When and who will build it
- Who, how and when payment shall be made

It is a requirement that Council be consulted to determine if a Development Application is required to erect a fence. Some standard fences are exempt.
