The Friends of Temora Shire Cemeteries (FOTSC) meet every Wednesday morning from around 8am where they tend to tree prunina, fillina in sink holes, installing row markers, weed spraying, research, gardening, tidving and making

"Sadly we don't always have success, especially with graves that date back to the 19th Century, but we do what we can.

DROUGHT COMMUNITIES PROGRAM UPDATE

THE wider world may have stood still for the past few months but there is plenty going on around the Shire thanks to the Drought Communities Program, a Federal Government economic stimulus package that allows local community infrastructure to be upgraded, renovated or repaired.

Initiative began back in February and residents are now seeing the results of the initiative with \$1 million worth of initiatives underway in our Shire.

The package has included repairs and/or upgrades to:

\$5,000 was also granted for community events, but these are currently on hold during Covid-19 government restrictions.

"Deputy Prime Minister McCormack is a great friend of Temora Shire and we are grateful for his consistent and solid support in granting these funds and in his every day capacity as our Member for Riverina, said the Mayor of Temora Shire, Cr Rick Firman.

The Narraburra Church was decommissioned back in 2018 and local farming families rallied together to purchase the building as a community asset. Families were invited to contribute funds towards the purchase and refurbishment of the church building. It now represents a place for Narraburra families and the wider community to come together to

celebrate.

"The Drought Funding, as well as a donation from the Morangarell/Grogan Bushfire Brigade and a Temora Shire Council Heritage grant, has allowed us to carry out minor roof repairs, guttering and other plumbing works, replace timber work that had termite damage, resealing and painting of outside windows and other trims, gyprock replacement, repainting the outside of the building, installation of a small kitchen, a new toilet block, new water tanks, new covered outdoor area, the clearing of weeds and overgrown trees and general garden maintenance," explains Narraburra resident, Narelle Williams.

"We envisage a fundraising event every year to pay for ongoing costs of maintenance, electricity, rates and insurance – the first was meant to be a popup-pub in April (now postponed indefinitely). We hope that people will hire out the venue for various purposes and contributors are able to use the building for family and private functions once a year without cost. It will be a place where community events can take place,' she said.

Work on the Narraburra Church site is almost complete and the upgrades have employed a number of local tradies and suppliers such as Mick Callaghan, Killer Constructions, Speed's Rural Contracting, Dean Guymer Plumbing, Cleverdon's Steel, Pike's Concreting, and Dallas McKelvie Electrical.

\$310 Million for Drought Affected Farmers

LOCAL farmers and communities in the Cootamundra electorate will continue to receive vital drought assistance with the NSW Government providing a \$310 million boost to the Emergency Drought Relief Package.

Member for Cootamundra Steph Cooke said that this crucial funding will ease the financial burden on regional communities caused by the drought.

"My message to everyone in the Cootamundra electorate is that you have not been forgotten and I am determined to continue supporting our regional communities until the drought is well and truly behind us," Ms Cooke said.

Many locations don the surname of families still living in the region but other names are a little more cryptic.

This year we will delve deeper into the names we see on signposts across the Shire in our series "What's in a Name?" Fach month we are looking at themes under which our streets and parks have been named. n our fourth edition we

explore the names that pay homage to our gold mining past:

What's In A Name?

- Bloomfield Street George Bloomfield discovered a small patch of payable gold in shallow ground at Temora in January 1880. The street was later renamed "Hoskins Street".
- DeBoos Street Charles Edward DeBoos was the first resident Mining Warden and Police Magistrate on the
- Temora Goldfield Deutcher Street -Augustus Ludig Deutcher owned the property "Red Hill" where Temora's alluvial goldfield was located
- Quartz Street a reference to the prized stone
- Sharpe Street Earnest Augustine Lambie Sharpe M.A. Police Magistrate at Forbes and acting Warden in charge of the Temora goldfield August – December 1880
