Embrace Temora program will be invigorated which Mr Soliman will support with his research and findings. The Embrace Temora project began in 2018 and consists of a working group who actively encourage the relocation of migrant and refugee workers to fill job vacancies in the Temora Shire.

In his role, Mr Soliman will aim to:

- Understand community and business motivations for attracting newcomers from refugee and migrant backgrounds
- Capture critical issues and concerns within the community around newcomer attraction
- Identify available resources, supporters or 'champions' to assist newcomers to establish in Temora Shire
- Capture unique individual and group perspectives of those with lived experience in relocating as a newcomer or employing a newcomer.

Mr Soliman joins Temora Shire Council's Economic and Community Development team in a contract running until the end of March 2022. He has a strong background in data analysis and holds a Bachelor of Engineering (Telecoms) – Hons 1, a Diploma in Engineering Practice and a Masters in Engineering (Research). Roy is looking forward to extending his experience in this unique role and helping Temora Shire become a more diverse and multicultural community.

NSW GROW, in conjunction with the Welcoming Cities Project, is coordinating a project that will support regional communities to better understand how ready they are to welcome people from refugee, asylum seeking and migrant backgrounds, and support them to stay for the long-term.

One of Temora's newest residents, Roy Soliman (pictured), has been appointed in the role of the GROW Local Facilitator for the shire. He will carry out research and community consultation to better understand how ready Temora Shire is as a Welcoming City.

Celebrate Safely with Family & Friends

TEMORA Shire Council's Road Safety Officer, Karen Trethowan, is reminding the community to take care on the roads.

"We want our community to be safe over the festive season and we are asking people NOT to drink and drive. In spite of the dangers of drink driving, statistics reveal 7.4 per cent of all road crashes within the Temora Shire involve alcohol," she said.

"Because of the crash risk drink driving poses to the driver, their passengers and others within the community, we are reminding everyone there are alternative choices to arrive home safely after consuming alcohol rather than getting behind the wheel: Designated driver, taxi, courtesy bus or walking home" she said.

Parking Limit Reminder

AS WE head full-throttle into the busy Christmas season, relieving TBEG Executive Officer, Ms Shontayne Ward, reminds residents to be mindful of parking time limits in the CBD.

"We urge residents to be considerate. If you are parking for an extended length of time try to park off the main street to free up space in the shorter limited parking spaces", she said.

The two centre blocks of Hoskins Street generally have 1 hour parking spaces with the exception of a few shorter-time spots outside Capital Chemist and the post office.
