Great Progress for Stronger Country Communities

TEMORA Shire residents are benefiting from the completion of many projects under the Stronger Country Communities Fund.

With assistance from the Drought Communities Fund, the Arah Park main street beautification project will commence shortly.

The project includes updating landscaping and installing street furniture, which will complement the

already beautiful main street.

Nearing completion are two projects that will service both visitors and the local community.

Nixon Park Sporting Complex is receiving an upgrade to the clubhouse, kiosk and amenities which will live up to the dated facilities and give local sporting groups a complex they can be proud of.

The installation of new

play equipment and fire pits at Lake Centenary will provide visitors and locals with the perfect excuse to visit Lake Centenary all year round.

It is expected that these projects will be completed in the next few weeks.

These upgrades follow on from previous grants through the Stronger Country Communities program.

- Temora Memorial Town Hall
- Temora Recreation Centre - Upgrade of changeroom amenities
- Temora West Sporting Ground - Construction of a new clubhouse
- Arah Park Recreation Ground - Upgrade of amenities, swimming pool and skate park
- Temora Golf Club - Installation of irrigation system
- Temora town entrances - Tree planting
- Temora Town Tennis Courts - Resurface two tennis courts
- Temora Town Netball Courts - Resurface netball courts

Bushfire Appeal Exceeds Expectations

THE MAYOR'S Bushfire Appeal has raised a whopping \$33,289.35 in just over a month.

"I am humbled by the generosity of Temora Shire residents," said Mayor, Rick Firman. "I've always known that we are a caring and giv-

ing community, but this figure has blown me away."

The money will go directly to those affected by bushfires in the Snowy Valley to assist with rebuilding their lives after the destruction by the fires.

"We all watched with hor-

ror as the emergency unfolded, and we wanted to help," said Mayor Firman. "This fundraising campaign is our way of telling our neighbours that we are thinking of them in these tough times," he concluded.

47TH ANNUAL LIVE EXHIBITION

THE Bundawarra Centre will be abuzz with activity when the doors are opened for the 47th Annual Live Exhibition.

With demonstrations in needlework, china painting, card making, spinning, bush poetry, bush carpentry, leather working, wood-working, shearing, blacksmithing and rope making, visitors will have plenty to see and do.

"Our Ford Feature Parade is the highlight of the day," said Museum Curator, Bill Speirs. "The parade features vintage fire engines, tractors, machinery and motor

vehicles as well as the grand parade of veteran ambulances."

All the major exhibits from the museum will be on display as well as featured demonstrations using many of the museum's machinery and artefacts.

"It's a great opportunity to see our normally static exhibits come to life. The machinery, vehicles and equipment that usually sit dormant in their display areas are used in demonstrations that educate and enthral audiences," Bill said.

In the past the exhibition has drawn

large crowds and people often travel a considerable distance to attend the day.

"It really is a great family day out," says Bill. "A lot of the machinery that is on display has been replaced by modern versions and more efficient products. It's really insightful for our younger visitors to learn just how hard life might have been for early agricultural producers."

Morning and afternoon tea, sausage and steak sandwiches, as well as drinks and ice creams, will be available throughout the day.

FREE TRAINING AT TAFE

TAFE NSW Temora Campus is offering a number of digital skill set courses. The courses are fully subsidised for eligible participants through the NSW Government Drought Funding.

Courses available under this scheme include building skills in computer literacy, mental health, drug and alcohol training, medical reception skills, accounting skills, business administration, real estate, tourism and travel, leadership, writing skills, game harvesting and marketing and communication.

Participants must meet the Smart and Skilled eligibility criteria to receive the subsidy.

To be eligible participants must be:

- An Australian citizen, Australian permanent resident, Australian permanent humanitarian visa holder or New Zealand citizen; and
- No longer at school; and
- Living or working in NSW; and
- Aged 15 years or over; and
- be either a Commonwealth Welfare recipient or the dependant of a Commonwealth Welfare recipient or
- A NSW apprentice or new entrant trainee undertaking a qualification on the NSW Skills List.

Participants must also be:

- Aged between 15 and 30 years old when you start your training; and
 - Enrolling into a Smart & Skilled qualification at Certificate I, Certificate II, Certificate III or Certificate IV level on the NSW Skills List; or
 - Be aged 15-17 years old and currently in out-of-home care or aged 18-30 years old and previously been in out-of-home care (Social Housing residents)
- Scholarships are also available for people who have experienced domestic and family violence.

DROUGHT funding has also made it possible for TAFE NSW Temora Campus to offer free short courses to anyone who is interested in practical

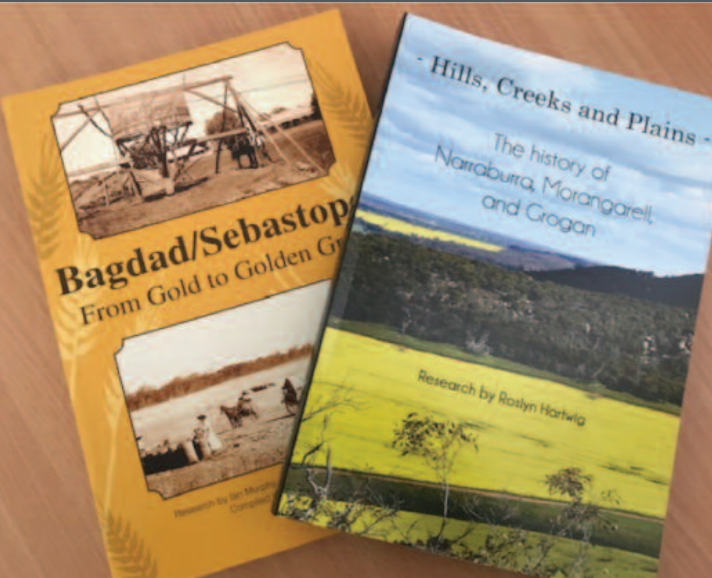
skills such as Forklift Truck Licence, Traffic Control, Agricultural Chemical Skill Set and Welding.

Regional Seniors Travel Card



OVER a 2-year trial period, Service NSW will offer eligible seniors a Travel Card to the value of \$250.

The card, which works like a credit card, allows seniors to pay for travel costs with selected retailers across Australia. The Regional Seniors Travel Card is redeemable for fuel costs, taxis and pre-booked Trainlink Regional trains and coaches.

To be eligible for the card you must be:

- An aged pensioner with a valid Pensioner Concession Card (you must have received the pension for at least one month); or
- A Commonwealth Seniors Health Card holder (you must have held your card for at least one

- month); and
- Living in a designated regional area of NSW outside of Sydney, Newcastle and Wollongong. Temora Shire is named as a designated regional area.

To apply for the card you will need:

- Your personal details (name, date of birth, mother's maiden name)
- Your residential address and a delivery address
- Your phone number
- The issuer, number and expiry date of your Pension Concession Card or Commonwealth Seniors Health Card
- A MyServiceNSW Account and email address (only if you apply online)

Successful applicants will receive their card and

PIN within 10 working days. The card and PIN will arrive in separate envelopes.

Applications for 2020 will close on November 30, 2020.

To use the card you will need to swipe it at the point of purchase, select "credit" and enter your PIN.

If the cost of the transaction is more than the card balance you will be required to pay the outstanding balance by a different means.

The card can also be used online or over the phone. You will need to provide your card number, card expiry date and CVV number (the 3-digit code on the back of the card).

If the card is declined at point of purchase it means the retailer is operating under a non-travel related merchant category code.

You can apply for the card by: Visiting a Service NSW service centre, including Temora Shire Council Chambers, phoning 13 77 88 or visiting www.service.nsw.gov.au/transaction/apply-regional-seniors-travel-card and follow the steps.

LEP Creates Opportunities

TEMORA Shire Council has completed the process of amending Council's main planning document, the Temora Local Environmental Plan 2020.

The plan now lists a wider range of land uses that can be permitted with the consent of Council. This includes

additional uses within the RU1 Primary Production zone – artisan food and drink industries, markets, restaurants or cafes, and secondary dwellings; and within the B2 Local Centre zone – attached and semi-detached dwellings.

These changes will

support the diversification of the local economy and enable Temora Shire to be even further open to new development opportunities.

Council is still required to assess all applications on their merits and determine if the proposed use is acceptable on the site.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

HAVE you ever wondered about the origin of your street name or a local park?

Many locations don't have the surname of families still living in the region, but other names are a little more cryptic. This year we will delve deeper into the names we see on signposts across the Shire in our series "What's in a Name?"

Each month we are looking at themes under which our streets and parks have been named.

In this edition we look at the locations named due to their proximity to properties or places:

- **Aurora Street** references the morning star as it sits on the eastern boundary of the original town.
- **Austral Street** is named for the south star as it sits on the southern border of the original town
- **Bulk Head Road** gets its name from the fact that a major grain handling facility was in the vicinity of the street
- **Camp Street** sits in proximity to where the first local police camp was positioned
- **Industrial Avenue** refers to the nearby industrial area
- **Miners Street** is where the reef mining area of upper Temora was located
- **Polaris Street** refers to the Pole Star, sitting on the northern boundary of the original town
- **Substation Street** is where the electricity substation is situated
- **Vesper Street**, the evening star, sits on the western side of the original town
- **Moroney's Lane** is located where the Moroney family property lies
- **Bartondale Road** is named after the property of

George Thomas East, which was in the vicinity of the road

Many streets reference their geographical location such as; Junee Road, Hillview Park and Airport Street.

Other streets are named with botanical references; Coolabah Street, Hakea Street and Wattle Street

Not to mention all the lanes throughout the Shire named after the people who have farmed the paddocks around them for generations

Village Flood Study

COUNCIL has begun the Ariah Park and Springdale Villages Floodplain Risk Management Studies and Plans, which is supported by the NSW Government's Floodplain Management Program. This program aims to reduce the impacts of existing flooding and flood liability on communities. The project will be managed by a

Committee which will include Councillors, community representatives, Council staff and representatives of the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment and the SES.

If you are a community member with knowledge of past flooding events in either Ariah Park or

Springdale villages, Council would welcome your contribution to this project. Residents of Ariah Park and Springdale villages and surrounds will be sent a survey during April asking them to share their experiences of past flood events. This information is vital to calibrate the flood model used in this study.
