\$100 DINE & DISCOVER VOUCHERS

DINE & Discover NSW is helping businesses across the hospitality, arts and tourism industries by encouraging consumer spending at COVID-Safe dining, entertainment and recreation venues.

Dine & Discover NSW was tested with a small number of participants at The Rocks and Broken Hill in early February and then piloted with a larger group in Sydney CBD, Northern Beaches and Bega Valley from late February.

The program will be rolled out across the state in March 2021. Every NSW resident

aged 18 and over will be eligible for four \$25 Dine & Discover NSW vouchers worth \$100 in total.

Two vouchers can be used for dining out at restaurants, cafes, bars, pubs and clubs, and two vouchers can be used for entertainment and recreation, including cultural institutions, live music, and arts venues.

Residents can use their vouchers to dine at businesses from Monday to Thursday, and spend on activities at arts, entertainment and tourism businesses, seven days a week (excluding public holidays). Businesses can

register online to participate in Dine & Discover NSW. Vouchers will be distributed to NSW residents from early 2021, with some residents being the first to redeem their vouchers in selected trial locations prior to a statewide rollout.

## Primary Producer Registration Concessions

FROM February 4th, 2021, eligible primary producers must provide the following to be granted a primary producer concession when establishing, transferring or changing the usage on a vehicle registration:

1. Declaration of Eligibility for a Registration Concession AND
2. A declaration signed by a registered tax agent or accountant stating the applicant

is a primary producer as defined by the Motor Vehicles Taxation Act 1988 AND

3. A Tax Averaging Certificate or a Tax Assessment Notice from the Australian Taxation Office (not more than 2 years old) OR a letter from the Australian Taxation Office confirming the applicant is registered as a primary producer (not

more than one year old).

### Note:

1. Heavy Vehicles have different eligibility requirements until 30 June 2021.
2. Primary producer vehicles are not:
  - Used for let (leased)
  - Used for hire (rented)
  - Used to receive a fee or reward (including a fee or reward from another primary producer).

## YOUth-Made Market Boosting Young Entrepreneurs

THE inaugural Temora YOUth-Made Market is a project that connects young entrepreneurs with experienced business owners to receive mentorship as they establish their own start-up business in the Temora Shire.

The YOUth-Made Market is just one of 35 initiatives across the state to receive a share in the NSW Government's \$1.5 million Youth Opportunities grants program.

"This grant allows us to fully support young people with a vision to make, create, or provide a service product that can be sold at their own market stalls in April," said Youth Development Officer

Sheree Elwin.

"Local business representatives will mentor our young participants in areas such as financial literacy, merchandising, branding, marketing, product development and retail sales.

"We are very fortunate to have such a supportive business community who are willing to give their time to support and mentor these young people with their start-up ideas," Ms Elwin said.

The program is open to anyone under the age of 25 who has an idea or product that can be developed into a small business.

"Whether you hand-make items or provide a

service, the YOUth-Made Market could be the launching pad for new small businesses in our community," she concluded.

The program will culminate in a two day market to be held in the old Target Building in Hoskins Street on Friday 16th and Saturday 17th April, 2021.

It will be here that the young entrepreneurs can show off their new business and enterprising skills.

## SEEKING EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST FOR U3A

ARE you over 50? Do you love to learn? Perhaps you have a specific skill set that others may be interested in learning. We are seeking expressions of interest from residents who are interested in broadening their own knowledge and helping others learn with the development of a University of the Third Age, or U3As as they are more often called, are voluntary, non-profit organisations which aim to offer older people low-cost educational opportunities which operate in a pleasant, supportive social setting. There are no formal entry requirements, no examinations and no "awards". Instead, U3As are built on the premise that collectively older people have the skills and knowledge to provide learning opportunities (education) for themselves. After all, "experts" of all kinds, in all fields, eventually retire!

The word "university" in the title is used in its earliest sense – a community of scholars who get

together to help each other in a learning/social experience. The principles of self-help and mutual support are the cornerstone of the U3A movement.

"We feel that Temora residents offer a broad scope of skills and knowledge and that this program would be a success in our community," said Temora Shire Council's General Manager, Gary Lavelle.

"The scope of courses is only limited by the resources, leaders, and tutors available. If you build a strong U3A network, the possibilities are endless," he said

"Courses can be one-offs, a series of events or an ongoing social group."

### Examples of courses being run by U3As in Australia include:

- Armchair Theatre (reading and analysing plays)
- Armchair Travel (share travel ideas and experiences)
- Australian Constitution (explore the Federal Constitution in a discussion group)
- Book Discussion Groups

- Botany
- Computer/Internet skills
- Creative Writing
- Comparative Religion
- Current Affairs
- Genealogy
- Geology/Geography
- Languages
- Law
- Mathematics
- Music Appreciation
- Philosophy
- Psychology
- Public Speaking
- Science

"If we get a good amount of interest for this program we will begin to see the scope of what the Temora Shire U3A could offer its members," said Mr Lavelle.

"There really is no limit as to how the courses are offered or the topics they cover.

"Styles of teaching will vary from the traditional lecture to sessions of high member participation. Some tutors will come from academic backgrounds, whilst others may have skills or trades developed over many years. The collective willingness to share their knowledge and enthusiasm is what U3A is all about," he concluded.

## Speeding is never safe

ONE of the biggest challenges we face as a community is reducing fatalities and serious injury on our rural road network.

Speed is the biggest behavioural factor contributing to death and injury on our local roads in the Temora Shire. Speed increases both the risk of having a crash, as well as the severity of the crash outcome. The faster you are going – the more time is needed to avoid a crash. At higher speeds the impact of a crash is more severe, with the likelihood of death and serious injury increasing. When speeding, the distance required to stop also increases.

Deaths on our country roads are closer to home than you think. While country residents make up only one-third of the NSW population, two-thirds of all fatalities occur on our country roads, with more than 70 percent of these fatal crashes involving

country residents – someone's grandmother, grandfather, mother, father, brother, sister, child or neighbour.

Your choice of speed can affect others as well as yourself. By slowing down you reduce the risk or severity of a crash and allow yourself more time to react if other drivers make mistakes.

Safety on our country roads is a shared responsibility and we need to avoid risky behaviour when driving. The choices we all make behind the wheel need to be smart and safe. Ultimately, there is no excuse for unsafe behaviour on the road because it can have

tragic and life-changing consequences. We all need to be compliant and responsible when travelling on our country roads, because all



## THEATRE RE-OPENS

THE Temora Town Hall Theatre has reopened after its devastating closure in early January due to flood damage.

The roof of the theatre collapsed under the pressure of stagnant water in the box gutters above. Council and Mick Reardon Building worked quickly to restore the theatre and rectify the issue, allowing the theatre to reopen in early February.

"We are so grateful to the team for getting us back in action so quickly," said Manager, Beth Firman.

"Covid has placed the future of our theatre in jeopardy, and we were really relying on the January school holiday trade to help us get back on track, so the flood damage was

devastating."

The theatre can now fit 62 patrons under Covid rules and Mrs Firman is doing her best to design an attractive program for movie goers.

"At the moment it is really difficult to lock in films as many distributors are sending their films straight to streaming platforms or delaying their premieres," she said.

"We want to screen films that the community want to see, but we have restrictions in the scope of films, unfortunately.

"Rest assured, we will get the best films possible to ensure our patrons can continue to enjoy our little theatre.

"Residents can pick up a paper schedule from the Town Hall Theatre or from Council office. Our

road users can make mistakes, but a mistake should never cost someone their life, or their long-term wellbeing.

The road toll is not just a number, it is real people and could include your family and friends. We should never accept that people die on our country roads.
