SCOTT REARDON RETURNS AS OUR AUSTRALIA DAY AMBASSADOR

AUSTRALIA Day will kick off in Ariah Park for Breakfast at 8am in Davey Park

Temora will start the day with a breakfast commencing at 8.30am in Gloucester Park, which will include Australian Citizen's ceremony, and performance by local singersongwriter, Craig Giles, who has toured and performed in Australia and abroad for years.

Our 2024 Australia Day Ambassador is local legend, Gold-medal Paralympian, and Water Ski Champion Scott

Reardon OAM. He won water skiing world championships in announcement and for the 2007 and 2009. He

represented Australia at the 2012 Summer Paralympics in athletics, winning a silver medal in the Men's 100 m T42. At the 2016 Rio Paralympics, he went one placing better to win the gold medal. Reardon has won the Men's 100 m T42 in three consecutive World Para Athletics Championships, from 2013 to 2017. He competed at the 2020 Tokyo Paralympics, his third games.

There are currently 1,376 grants worth \$58.4B, including The Drought Infrastructure Fund which aims to assist farmers to identify and address risks to their farming enterprises, improve permanent farm infrastructure, ensure long term productivity and sustainable land use plus aiding in meeting changes to seasonal conditions. A total funding pool of \$1 billion is available, of which \$726,566,659 is available as of 1 November 2023
